

## WiN IAEA participates in INMM International Science Fair

On 26 March, the International Science Fair took place in the Sportshall of the American International School in Vienna, organized by the Institute of Nuclear Material Management (INMM) and WiN IAEA. Five different international schools (American, Vienna, Danube, Christian and Lyçee Français) participated to compete for the best Junior and Senior Awards for scientific/technical projects of individual students or teams of students aged between 12 and 18 years in the fields of Biological and Health Sciences, Physical and Computing Sciences, Environmental and Life Sciences, and Engineering and Technology Sciences.

The judges were volunteers taken from UN organizations residing in Vienna International Center and from Permanent Missions to the UN including WiN IAEA chapter members; they evaluated about 50 projects exhibited and presented by about 80 students. The award ceremony took place on 31 March during a banquet at the Vienna International Center where the awardees were nominated and prices were handed over to the students. The WiN IAEA chapter donated a specific award which were presented to the students below.

The judges and the visitors were impressed with the skills and enthusiasm of all students leaving them with the difficult decision whom to award: In short we would have loved to give awards to every single project and student! We congratulate all students and specifically the WiN awardees for their achievements and encourage them to continue their studies hopefully leading to a carrier in Natural Sciences.

#### Senior WiN IAEA Award: Ms. Dinushi Pieries (VIS)

The project REM Sleep: Lucid Dreaming and Sleep Paralysis by was presented by Ms. Dinushi Pi-

eries. Driven by own experience and her concern that in her school students are subject to high psychological stress, she investigated how lucid dreaming and sleep paralysis affects male and female students in her class.

She specifically impressed by her deep in-sight research and personal interest of the scientific field of sleep and psychology, which goes far beyond ordinary student's knowledge, and her firmness to pursue a carrier in the field of neuroscience. She convinced that this project is close to her heart, and eloquently and professionally presented her subject.



#### Junior WiN IAEA Award: Ms. Anna Kullnigg (AIS)



Anna Kullnigg studied if gender and taste are related and she convinced the audience when presenting her project "Chemosenses" that females have better tastings than males. She investigated this with an experiment to explore on the senses of her female and male school mates by testing on their evaluation of different products and odors.

For her age she demonstrated an excellent knowledge of the scientific field, she conducted the experiment with care and interpreted the results professionally. She also exhibited strong communication skills and presented her study convincingly.



### **Seminar on Cross-Cultural Communication**

On Tuesday, 21 June, cross-cultural communications expert Michael Gates gave a seminar to WiN IAEA members entitled "Leading and Working Across Cultures – an Opportunity for Women." Mr. Gates, the Group Managing Director for Richard Lewis Communications, incorporated personal experiences with research from the field to address some of the challenges facing communication between different cultures. Attendees were encouraged to actively participate and share their own experiences and ideas. In addition to addressing general challenges and strategies for cross-cultural communication, Mr. Gates emphasized how some of the communication styles which are generally categorized as "feminine" are useful in successful cross-cultural communication.

## Joint WiN IAEA—WIIS-Austria Retreat

Members of WiN IAEA and Women in International Security (WIIS-Austria) spent the weekend of 28-29 January in Alternbach to discuss 2011 activities and organizational structure and to socialize in a relaxing atmosphere.
